Angry at his cancer, angry for having to be away from home, and frustrated for having to follow rules (no food in the guest rooms, not being gone from the house for more than 48 hours, etc.) Over time, however, James has come to feel that his stay here has been an important part of his journey. He has formed friendships with a variety of other guests, become a regular member of the Wednesday Bingo crew, is making a quilt, and is always ready to lend a hand to other guests. James even goes out of his way to let us know when he goes home for the weekend he's not gone for longer than the allowed time.



James inquired one day about the possibility of going to a WVU football game. Thanks to an anonymous donor, James and Robert Jewitt (left side of group photo) surprised another guest, Charlene Robertson (middle of group photo) by taking her to her first ever college sporting event. The group was invited to tailgate with members of the Yates Construction team (also pictured). The WVU Book Exchange and Yates Construction donated WVU gear for them and they had a wonderful time.



Each year we decorate the Family House with wreaths that are donated for the wreath auction. James immediately came and inquired about purchasing the wreath that hung on his door. He explained that he isn't going to be here for the auction and wanted to make sure he was able to take the wreath home. James said, "the wreath is part of my journey, I need to take it home!" James also made a quilt while he was here and he wanted to make sure we included that in his story as well. He and another long term guest worked side by side to create their masterpieces.
